Cliff was involved in several historic local wins for progressive candidates of color and women, winning tenant protections and housing justice fights against negligent landlords, expanding regional transit and raising the minimum wage. As the youngest candidate in Renton's electoral race, Carmen has a great deal of experience working with youth, which deeply resonates with us at the Bus. In our candidate questionnaire, Carmen expressed her commitment to preserving the environment, expanding access to affordable housing and protecting renters, and building up the city's public transportation infrastructure.

She is committed to working against the institutional inequities that disproportionately impact communities of color, which she notes is crucial in the fight for Black liberation and Indigenous sovereignty. As a city council member, she plans to expand community spaces and resources to support and uplift Renton's most vulnerable and marginalized communities. Carmen plans to be a leader who will listen and take guidance from her community, to best serve their hopes and interests.

Iris works to help bridge the gaps between housing, food, and other basic needs for marginalized communities of SeaTac. We believe Iris' lived experiences will help her better serve her community and we appreciated how holistic she approaches the issues of education equity, tenants' rights, and marginalized communities' experiences with COVID.
